**Arches** are a Renaissance architecture aesthetic that is expected to make a return in 2023. This design trend is thought to influence architecture, furniture design, and decorative elements.

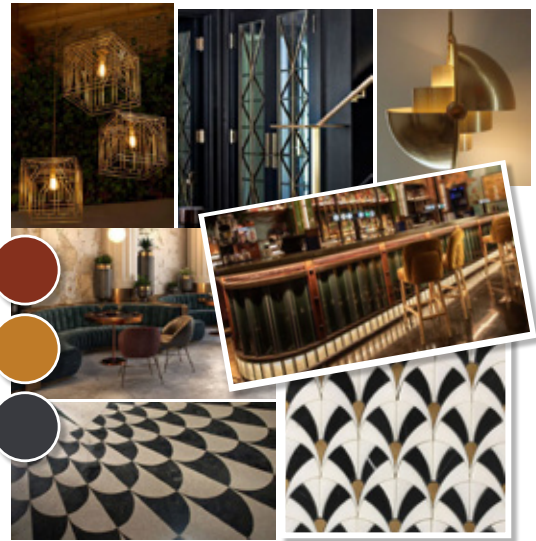
Arches depict strength and support, creating a powerful and timeless symbol, with striking transitions as you flow and move through your space. As visual elements, archways can frame a design feature

We expect to see not only arched thresholds in the hospitality industry but arched inspired wall designs, tiles, gantries, doors, and furniture.



**Art Deco's** ornate details are on the rise. Brighter colours, geometric patterns, and symmetry are beginning to make an appearance and replace design trends of the past. Interiors are beginning to sway from minimalism to slightly more decorative styles.

Art Deco originated in the 1920s and reached its peak in 1930s,

however in 2023 it is anticipated however in 2023 it is anticipated to make a triumphant return to the industry.

According to Carré D'Artistes blog, "It is characterised by the natural materials associated with luxury that harmonizes perfectly with a warm noble colour". Geometric prints have already made an appearance this year and are most definitely on the rise to dominate in 2023.
